Glen Oaks Community College is proud to offer the Truck Driver Certificate program in cooperation with International Trucking School, Inc. Included are three 5-week driver training classes over a 15 weeks period.

Heavy truck drivers today earn an average pay of \$37,160 and their numbers are expected to grow substantially by 2016.

The International Trucking School, Inc. has been in existence since 1990 and is fully-licensed by the State of Michigan. ITS conducts training with several other Michigan Community Colleges, including Macomb Community College and Monroe County Community College.

The program may be completed in two semesters and many of the courses (see page two), with the exception of the ITS driver portion, may be completed online at times convenient for the student. Included is a business entrepreneur class because modern truckers are small-business people. An introduction to computers and software is needed because of today's reliance on computers. An industrial communications course helps drivers complete plans and reports. A wellness/lifestyle course lets drivers know how to live a healthy life on the road.

Truck Driver Certificate--This 31 credit certificate provides students with commercial driver training. Training will be provided in theoretical, as well as practical operation of vehicles on a driving range and local highway. Students will acquire knowledge on areas related and applicable to the trucking industry, including basic computer skills, entrepreneurship, and health and wellness. Upon completion of the program, students will receive a certificate of completion from the college and be eligible to take the class "A" Commercial Drivers License exam.

Admission Requirements:

- Regular admission requirements to Glen Oaks.
- Must be at least 18 years of age.
- Have a valid driver's license.
- Have an acceptable driving record to obtain a Training Instruction Permit (TIP) from the Secretary of State.
- Complete and pass the Department of Transportation physical examination and drug screening.
- Meet the requirements of the Motor Carrier Federal Safety Regulations, Qualifications of Drivers.

Long-haul truck drivers needed

According to the American Trucking Association, the total tons of products needing to be transported by truck is expected to grow to 13 billion tons by 2014. More drivers will be needed to move that amount of product across the nation. Of the estimated 3.4 million truck drivers on the road, just over 1.3 million of them are long-haul truck drivers. The long-haul portion of the trucking industry is the hardest hit by driver shortages, so it also the fastest growing part of the industry. The association predicts a need for 200,000 new long-haul drivers over the next 10 years.

BAM 101 COLLEGE SKILLS AND PORTFOLIO WRITING 3 Credits, 3 Contacts

Areas of concentration are portfolio writing, self-assessment, skills in listening, note taking, improving test scores and time management, self-esteem, goal setting and educational development plans. The portfolio writing is especially useful for students intending to transfer to a university or preparing for employment interviews. This course is a required course for anyone wishing to earn either a certificate or degree in the business area.

Prerequisite: None

EDP 101 INTRODUCTION TO COMPUTERS AND SOFTWARE 4 Credits, 4 Contacts

A survey course on computer concepts and applications associated with the current generation of computer technology. Students will study terminology as it applies to computers, networks, operating systems, and internet usage. This course includes a hands-on component where students will work with current productivity software such as Microsoft (XP) in word processing, spreadsheets and databases with the Windows Operating system.

Prerequisites: None

BAM 110 FOUNDATION OF ENTREPRENEURSHIP 2 Credits, 2 Contracts

This course is designed to provide an overview of small business and what is necessary to start a small business: Including small business in free enterprise, the entrepreneur, opportunities and trends, business plan, legal aspects, financing, organizational planning and marketing.

VTI 106 INDUSTRIAL COMMUNICATIONS 2 Credits, 3 Contacts

Basic Industrial Communications is designed to acquaint students with a variety of forms and documents used in the industrial workplace. Students will fill out process and inventory sheets, and be required to read, write, listen and respond to a variety of documents or tasks as specified by specific industrial standards.

Prerequisite: None

NSH 106 WELLNESS AND LIFESTYLE 2 Credits, 3 Contacts

This course addresses cardiovascular fitness, flexibility and muscular endurance; also exercise, nutrition and stress management. Improving personal health and well being is the goal.

Truck Driving Course Statement:

International Trucking School believes diesel truck driver training courses (TDT courses) should respond to the needs of the trucking industry. The professional driver's field is growing due to demands from industry to move increasing volumes of freight with safety and efficiency. The importance and role of the driver in today's economy is best expressed by realizing that three (3) out of every four (4) tons of freight in the United States is moved by truck. Practically everything we eat, wear, buy, and sell is transferred by truck. The training curriculum at ITS is responsive to these ever growing demands for qualified and safe drivers.

International Trucking School has developed an integrated course of study where classroom and "hands-on" training are combined in such a manner that students learn and practice applications the same day. This method has been successful in keeping students motivated.

The goals of this program are to provide skills training for students to attain the level of competence necessary to meet government and industry standards for entry-level employment in the transportation industry. As a result, opportunities for productive growth in the career field are enhanced.

Each student will learn key functions of vehicle systems, for instance, from engine to brakes, and the importance of components to safe and efficient operation. Education includes federal and state requirements, including need for permits. Proficiency development includes practice on range and street operations.

Course resources include a textbook, the Michigan Commercial Truck Driver License Manual, Truck Driver's Guidebook, Federal Motor Carrier Safety Regulations, access to a Personal Computer (PC) with a Windows Operating System (Windows XP, Vista or Windows 7) and internet connectivity. The PC must have an Internet Browser such as Firefox or Internet Explorer, Windows Media Player, Adobe Reader and Microsoft PowerPoint Viewer.
